2009 Veterans Day Memorial Service - American Military Cemetery, Madingley

When Margaret and I set off for the Memorial Service it was damp and there was fog, a typical November day. Carrying a Royal British Legion wreath of poppies, I reported to the Air Force 1st Lieutenant who was in change of the Wreath Bearers. The Officer checked his list and told me to report to the bearer who had the number 34. I did and was handed a ticket with the number 34 on and the Order of Service. This was unprecedented to me. I applaud this method of wreath bearer and wreath layer meeting before the Service, as it gives on the opportunity to speak to the wreath bearer and thank him. There is a much more solemn atmosphere when standing in front of the Wall of the Missing.

We found our seats in the small marque which was most welcome. Major Leonard T. Rose, Commander, 423rd Security Forces Squadron, was Master of Ceremony who introduced the Official Party. Among those present was Brigadier General (Ret.) Steven R. Hawkins who is the Director, European American Battle Monuments Commission, in Paris who has the Cemetery at Madingley under his command. The Service was well attended when one remembers that most War Memorial's in the country, has its own service and two minute's silence.


The 46 wreaths that were on the official list were a mixture of floral tributes and Royal British Legion wreath's of red poppies. The one I laid on behalf of the 91st BG(H) MA, was paid for by our very good friend, Paul Limm. I was rather pleased as the 91st BG(H) MA logo placed in the center, was a scanned copy of a cloth patch which came out exceptionally well. It looked great!

As I looked at the Wall of the Missing in front of me, I noticed the name of a 91ster. He was S/Sgt. Earl Miller, 401st BS who along with the rest of his crew, was missing on the mission to Wilhelmshaven on the 3rd November 1943. Just above his name was the name Major Alton [Glenn] Miller, AAF Band.

During the Service mention was made of the pristine condition that the Cemetery was in. With many trees in the Cemetery and the leaves falling at this time of the year, it is extremely difficult for David Bedford and his staff to keep the Cemetery in such a splendid condition.

Both Margaret and I came away with the same conclusion that it had been a very good service. For me, it was an honour and privilege to represent your Group on such an occasion.

This year we will begin adding more existing 91st memorials to our web page. The first addition will be the *Chow-hound* memorial at the Arizona Wing of the Commemorative Air Force Museum in Mesa, Arizona. The museum recently added a permanent exhibit honoring the crew of *Chow-hound* shot down August 8, 1944 and the 91st Bomb Group. The display consists of an original prop from *Chow-hound* recovered from the crash site and a mock B-17 tail

Veeps Views

Mick Hanou

I recently encountered a number of veterans who were surprised at my interest in their role in WWII. I explained how they had liberated my parents and that really opened up the conversation. We had some great discussions of their service, and I wish I had my tape recorder with me to capture some of their stories. They were in support units, whose feats are not always as well documented as flight operations'. So, I learned a lot more about what goes on behind the operations. This reminded me of some discussions with Whit Hill and George Birdsong years ago on the installation of forward-firing machine guns in the noses of the B-17-F models. I find it interesting to learn about ground crew life, support staff, local conditions, and such things that you can't often find in books, as they weren't well documented. I'd like to learn more about the downed-aircraft recovery units.

I thanked the wives for their service on the Home Front and that got even more discussion going. It seems they are not often asked. So they shared stories about rationing and recycling, growing vegetables in gardens in the yard, how one of them had her first chance to work in a factory, and about their concern for husbands and brothers fighting overseas. One was even a nurse in the Navy so she had some interesting views of the conflicts from a lady's point of view.

So, on a recurring theme - I hope that you have told your family your stories and they have documented them in some way. We, of the "Next Generation", cannot preserve your history without such stories being shared. Hopefully your children or grandchildren are interested and you have made arrangements with family to retain memorabilia - and as important is the context of those memorabilia. Jim and I are making efforts to establish display cases at the 91st BG display in Chino for memorabilia you wish to donate. And I don't refer only to flight logs or official documents. We don't often see items from ground crew, office staff, or support units - their history is often not as fully documented. The paraphernalia, items, diaries, letters, and photos you saved - when placed in context - will prove very valuable to maintaining the history of your outfit. So, please retain these items, and their context, for family first. Then consider donating them to the main repositories of 91st BG history – the Tower Museum Bassingbourn and the growing 91st Display at Chino.



B-17 Navigator – Frank Farr



It is the real life story of a pilot of the famed 91st Bomb Group, the Memphis Belle Group, in World War II, and the missions flown in that Group by the author and his comrades. It follows him from the time his B-17 was shot down over the German-French border, he was rescued and hidden by villagers in the tiny village of Baslieuse, then

The book chronicles, in fascinating detail, the life and training of those young men who made up the heroic 8th Air Force, and describes the affectionate relationship



A heavy bomb group consists of 36 heavy bombers. The 91st lost 207 planes during its WWII combat time-32 during the author's flight tenure. Dr. Anderson uses the words of the extraordinary crews of those planes to describe the training they absorbed, the missions they flew, the results they achieved, the tragedy of watching their planes explode and their friends die, and the heroism that brought so many near fatally damaged planes home with their dead and wounded crews.

This is also a story of growing up in pre-war America, and of the growth and development of that sturdy character which enabled these young men and their children and grandchildren to help create today's world. God bless them, their achievements, and what their heroism made possible so that we could live in the world we do today.

It's official: DD-214s are NOW Online.

The National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) has provided the following website for veterans to gain access to their DD-214s online:

http://vetrecs.archives.gov/

This may be particularly helpful when a veteran needs a copy of his DD-214 for employment purposes. NPRC is working to make it easier for veterans with computers and Internet access to obtain copies of documents from their military files.

Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new online military personnel records system to request documents.

Other individuals with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180, which can be downloaded from the online web site. Because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the request, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask veterans for additional information will be minimized. The new webbased application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating the records centers mailroom and processing time.

Please pass this information on to former military personnel you may know and their dependents.

Holiday Wreath at the Chow-hound crew gravesite

On Dec 12th, 5,000 volunteers placed over 15,000 wreaths at the base of the tombstones at Arlington National Cemetery. This is an annual event held at the cemetery and selected military cemeteries all over the country. Each year a specific section at Arlington is selected for the wreaths that have red ribbons. Military units, scouts, private citizens give their time that takes about 2 hours to honor our veterans in this most unique

manner. Normally, the older sections are selected because they have fewer visitors.

This year, thanks to the National Services Association, 1,000 wreaths were placed on the gravesites at Section 60. This section is an expansion of the cemetery where veterans from Iraq and the Afghan war are buried. In one part of the section, is a number of gravesites set aside for the remains of Americans were reported missing in action. Later, thanks to DNA and crash search teams, many of the missing were discovered and given military funerals at the Arlington. Near fresh graves is the burial site for the *Chow-hound* crew.

Since I was at the funeral for the crew, I visit the gravesite from time to time. Next to the site that has the names of the crew engraved on the large tombstone is the grave of a young lady who was killed in Iraq. She had been awarded the Silver Star - The price for freedom continues to be paid.

Officials launch new Air Force community Web site

WASHINGTON (AFRNS) - Air Force officials have launched a new Web site to meet social and informational needs of Airmen, civilians, retirees and their families.

The entire Air Force family: all Airmen, married and single; spouses; children; Air Force civilians; and retirees are invited to log on to www.usafservices.com, the official community Web site of the Air Force. The Web site allows users to add friends, send messages and update their personal profiles to notify family and friends about themselves.

Registered users will find the site allows for real - time socializing through the use of private or public chats, according to Mrs. Eliza Nesmith, Airmen and family

services chief. Officials are not just optimistic based on the site's popularity, but also by feedback received regarding its functionality.

Additionally, users can join networks or create forums ranging in topics from deployed - spouse support to families with special needs.

"The new Web site is going to be very exciting and useful for Airmen and their families," said Ms. Nesmith. "We have about 2,200 users who are using the site right now, from an initial 600."

Although Airmen and families may be surprised by the absence of Air Force Crossroads, officials emphasized this important capability will continue to exist under the new domain.

Airmen will see advantages of the new site, particularly the new social networking feature, Ms. Nesmith said. The feature called "My Journal", under the "Share" tab functions much like Facebook and allows registered users to invite friends, join groups and post photos or videos. Like commercial sites, users can restrict access, allowing only those known to them to view their information and post messages.

Active duty, retirees, reservists, Guardsmen, Department of Defense employees and others who are enrolled in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System may register as users on the site.

Users will notice that the Web site does not require the use of a common access card, but under optimized security measures, users can create a unique account username and a 15 character password, Ms. Nesmith said. Despite increased security measures, the site will be accessible from government and personal computers, she added.

As this new site was launched, Air Force officials discontinued GI Mail. Over the past few years, officials have noticed the feature was an important tool for families to stay in touch, while others used it for their official mail or even to pay bills.

"We are very sensitive to drawing down that capability ... but the social networking and contact with family during a deployment is going to be an easy and important part of usafservices.com," Ms. Nesmith said, noting a messaging feature, forums and a real - time.

While there is no capability or contact list link between Air Force Crossroads/GI Mail and the new usafservices.com Web site, users can click on the webmaster link to solicit help.

"Once Airmen and their families get accustomed to using the Web site, they will find that it is a very user friendly site that will give them much more flexibility than they have had on similar Web sites," Ms. Nesmith said. "During this Year of the Air Force Family, we really want to take a look at policies and procedures and see what we can do better. This is one of them."

Senior leaders have designated July 2009 through July 2010 as the Year of the Air Force Family, maintaining their commitment and attention to Airmen and their families as a top priority. Airmen and Family Support is one of the four pillars on which the Year of the Air Force Family is built, including Health and Wellness, Education, Development and Employment and Airman and Family Housing.
